

Bible Club revived with new direction



Winrock Mall rebuilders to benefit from tax deal

Albuquerque Uptown.

On Oct. 6 the Albuquerque city council approved a tax district for the Winrock Mall shopping area that will allow the developers to use tax revenue to build needed infrastructure. It also approved a separate TIDD for the Quorum at

A TIDD, or tax incremental development dis-

trict, is an economic tool designed to let developers use public money to build infrastructure like roads, sewers, and parks by diverting a portion of the gross receipts and property taxes back to the developer. The developers are allowed to sell bonds which can be paid back with the additional tax revenue. The reimbursements must be approved by a TIDD board before the developers can receive funds. In the case of the Winrock project, 70 per
